people fail to love others, they will also fail to the Lord's commandments. Being a child
of God means loving others the way that God has loved you.
Love is the motivator for that we do as Christians. Second Corinthians 5:14-15 says,
"For the love of Christ us, because we have concluded this: that one has died for all,
therefore all have died; and he died for all, that those who live might no longer live for themselves

love Jesus but also to our hearts and our lives totally to Him. That means we must

the evil and the good, and sends rain on the righteous and the unrighteous. For if you love those
who love you, what do you have? Do not even the tax collectors do the same? If you
greet only your brothers, what more are you doing than others? Do not even the Gentiles do the
same? Therefore you are to be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Matthew 5:43-48).
