Jesus the Savior

If Jesus is the Savior, then someone saving. Today we're going to explore what it
means to Jesus our Savior. More than through any other means we come to our
Father in heaven and the Lord Jesus Christ through the inspired Scriptures. In fact, if it were not for
the Scriptures, we would never know the most important of life. We wouldn't know where
we came from, why we exist, or what will happen to us when this life is over. God's message from
the beginning to end is a message of life, of hope, and of love.
Jesus came to this to be a Savior. The angel told Joseph before Jesus was born, "She
will bear a Son; and you shall call His name Jesus, for He will His people from their sins"
(Matthew 1:21). When John the Baptist introduced Jesus to his disciples, he said, "Behold, the Lamb
of God who takes away the of the world!" (John 1:29). Jesus "bore our sins in His body on
the cross, so that we might to sin and to righteousness; for by His wounds you were
healed" (1 Peter 2:24). Saving us isn't simply ridding us of the sin; it's also transforming our hearts
and lives tofor righteousness. John 3:16-17 says, "For God so loved the world, that He
His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life.
For God did not send the Son into the world to judge the world, but that the world might be
through Him." Jesus is indeed in the saving business. Jesus is our Savior from sin
implying that we needed saving and that sin is a problem.
Our reading today is 1 Timothy 1:12-16.
We all have a problem, and the Scriptures are clear, that problem is sin. The sin
problem is universal. You have it, I have it, and every responsible person has it. Psalm 14:2-3 says,
"The LORD has looked down from heaven upon the sons of men To see if there are any who
understand, Who seek after God. They have turned aside, together they have become corrupt;
There is no one who does, not even one." Isaiah understood the problem when he wrote,
"All of us like sheep have gone astray, Each of us has turned to his own" (Isaiah 53:6).
Again, Romans 3:23 simply says, "for all have sinned and fall short of the of God."

to realize that they're deceived spiritually until it's too People who give in to their
temptations frequently find ways to themselves rather than admit that they've sinned.
For these reasons, many will do everything possible to facing up to their sins.
John replies to people who think they sin, "If we say that we have no sin, we are
deceiving ourselves and the is not in us If we say that we have not sinned, we make
Him a and His word is not in us" (1 John 1:8, 10). Saying we have no sin in our lives means
that we're to ourselves; we aren't facing up to the truth. Saying we haven't sinned makes
the Lord out to be a liar for saying that we really do sin. When people deny they have sinned, they're
also denying what God in Scripture.
The apostle Paul, looking back at his life, said, "For we know that the Law is spiritual, but I am of
flesh, sold into bondage to sin. For what I am doing, I do not understand; for I am not practicing what
I would like to do, but I am doing the very thing I "(Romans 7:14-15). He continues in verses
19 to 24, "For the that I want, I do not do, but I practice the very that I do not
want. But if I am doing the very thing I do not want, I am no longer the one doing it, but
which dwells in me. I find then the principle that is present in me, the one who wants to do
good. For I joyfully concur with the law of God in the inner man, but I see a different law in the
members of my body, waging against the law of my mind and making me a prisoner of the
law of sin which is in my members. Wretched man that I am! Who will set me from the
body of this death?"
Think a little about Paul's despair, "Wretched man that I am!" Have you ever that way
about yourself when you considered your sins? Most of us might admit that we've sinned, but we
don't realize the sins we commit have affected us. People do unspeakable things they never
thought or wanted to do, and this makes them feel guilty about doing it and ashamed of themselves
for being the kind of person who would do it. Some feel there's no hope and no way out of this
despair, because of the pleasures of sin and how they enslave us. Paul asked, "Who will set me
from the body of this death?" He knew that if he continued his sinful ways, he would face
eternal separation from the God that he loved.
Thankfully, Paul answers the question. He said in verse 25, "Thanks be to God Jesus
Christ our Lord! So then, on the one hand I myself with my mind am serving the law of God, but on
the other, with my flesh the law of sin." This struggle goes on in the heart and mind of
person; but Jesus is the answer! He can deliver us from the death caused by sin. Romans
8:1-2 explains, "Therefore there is now no condemnation for those who are Christ Jesus. For
the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus has set you from the law of sin and of death."
Our salvation is a deliverance, a from sin and from an evil way of life. God wanted
something for us, and the blood of Jesus sacrificed on the cross provides the way of
freedom from sin and the way to a better and more abundant life. Galatians 1:4 says that Jesus Christ
"gave Himself for our sins so that He might (save) us from this present evil age,

according to the will of our God and Father." The first century was an evil, pagan age. Centuries
have passed; but we live in an evil age, filled with deception and temptation.
God wants to make a difference! Colossians 1:13-14 says, "For He rescued us from the domain
(that is, the power) of darkness, and transferred us to the of His beloved Son, in
whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins." We don't have to be under the devil's
and be condemned with him. Jesus can rescue us from the consequences of our sins
and give us hope and eternal life.
Jesus rescues sinners because He us and doesn't want us to be lost eternally. Jesus
rescues sinners not only by sacrificing Himself for our sins but also through giving us hope through
His, in the Word of God. Salvation becomes precious, because the consequences of sin
are so great. Knowing the of the Lord, we persuade people (2 Corinthians 5:11). Talking
about these matters is essential! It's cruel to suggest sin doesn't We talk about sin, but
we speak of the of the gospel message. We in love. We preach by
speaking of the love and the grace of God who offers forgiveness and eternal life with the Father in
heaven.
Have you considered people in Scripture that Jesus rescued? I think of the prodigal son who
selfishly lived for his own until he came to his senses. I think of the woman at the well,
who had five previous husbands and was at the time living with a man. I think of the chief tax
collector Zacchaeus, who may have been the most man in Jericho for collecting taxes
for Rome and for possibly defrauding the taxpayers. Jesus still loved all these people and wanted
them to Him. He was not like the Pharisees who grumbled at Him for
with sinners.
Have you considered the of sinners, Saul of Tarsus, who became the apostle Paul?
Read what Paul said in 1 Timothy 1:15-16. If Christ could save the chief of sinners, He can save
you too. If He can find mercy, so can you. If Christ could have perfect patience with the foremost
sinner, He can have perfect patience with you!
Salvation is not merely given to forgive; God wants to our lives. He wants
something better for us than to sin. He doesn't want us so enslaved to evil. He wants us
to for righteousness and to become a blessing. Paul describes this salvation and change
ReadTitus 3:3-7.
The world Christ has all those characteristics. You can see foolishness, and
disobedience, and deception, enslavement to lusts and pleasures. You can see people spending their
lives in malice and envy. You can see the hatefulness present in so many lives. What we need is an
answer to these selfish ways. People speak of worldly religions as an answer, but false religions

Yes, no matter who you are, you need a Savior, and the only one who can save you from sin and give you eternal life is our Lord Jesus Christ. We're all in the same condition. We cannot save ourselves by ourselves. We can't earn salvation or eternal life. **Read Ephesians 2:8-9.** God is not indebted to us; we are accountable to Him.

So how do we respond to this gift of grace from God? We place our trust in Him by believing in Jesus Christ and His promises. If we take God seriously, we can't continue in sin. We must repent of our evil and start living according to His will. With faith and repentance, we confess our faith in Jesus Christ and are baptized into His death. In baptism we're united with Him in His burial and resurrection. God gives us newness of life (we're born again) when we are baptized (Romans 6:3-7). Oh, won't you respond today?
