"You have heard that it was said, 'You shall not commit adultery'; but I say to you that

better for you to lose one of the parts of your body, than for your whole body to be thrown

of that which fills the heart. The good man brings out of his good treasure what is good; and
the evil man brings out of his evil treasure what is evil. But I tell you that every careless word
that people speak, they shall give an accounting for it in the Day of Judgment. For by your
words you will be justified, and by your words you will be condemned" (Matthew 12:34-37).
We are accountable for our Second Corinthians 5:10 says, "For we must all
before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each one may be recompensed for his
deeds in the body, according to what he has done, whether good or bad." God's Word further
says, "He will render to each one according to his: to those who by patience in
well-doing seek for glory and honor and immortality, he will give eternal; but for
those who are self-seeking and do not obey the truth, but obey unrighteousness, there will be
wrath and fury. There will be tribulation and distress for every human being who does
, the Jew first and also the Greek, but glory and honor and peace for everyone who
does, the Jew first and also the Greek. For God shows no partiality" (Romans 2:6-11).
More than that, we're accountable to Jesus whether we it or not, whether we
acknowledge it or not, or whether we with it or not. Jesus, our Creator, who died to
us from sin, is also our Lord. Not only do we confess Jesus as the Christ, the Son of
the living God, we also confess Him as our Lord. On the Day of Pentecost, the Holy Spirit
proclaimed through Peter and the apostles to all the Jews that God has made Him both Lord
and Christ, this Jesus whom you crucified (Acts 2:36). God has made Jesus to be your Lord
and mine.
The word "Lord" indicates crucial concepts. First, to call Jesus "Lord" means He is
divine, that is, He is deity; He is The word "Lord" is often spelled with all capital
letters in the Old Testament. "Lord" is the English word that is used to translate the Hebrew
word "Yahweh." This is the word the Lord God used to identify Himself to at the
burning bush.
In Exodus chapter three, God called Moses to lead the children of Israel out of Egypt and
into the Promised Land. Moses was reluctant and he offered several to God as to
why he shouldn't lead them. At one point Moses said to God, "If I come to the people of
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Israel and say to them, 'The God of your fathers has sent me to you,' and they ask me, 'What
is his name?' what shall I say to them?' God said to Moses, 'I am who I am.' And he said,
'Say this to the people of Israel, 'I am has sent me to you'" (Exodus 3:13-14). The word in
Hebrew "I am who I am" translates into Greek as "kurios" and into English as "LORD."
When the Holy Spirit, through Peter, proclaimed Jesus as Lord on Pentecost, he was
speaking of the Divinity of Jesus Christ. Philippians 2:6, which we read earlier,
says Jesus also existed in the of God. Read Philippians 2:5-11 again.
Jesus has always existed in the form of God, but He emptied himself and took the form of a
, being fashioned as a man. In humility, He His father by dying on a
cruel cross. Because Jesus suffered and died for us, God exalted Him, gave Him a name above
all names, and demands that at the name of Jesus, every knee will and every tongue

the body, you will" Following sin and the flesh will lead only to many
in this life and separation from God in the life to come. Galatians 6:7-8 says, "Do not be
deceived: God is not mocked, for whatever one, that will he also For the

the Spirit will from the Spirit reap eternal life."

As many as a of the population in the city of Rome were slaves in the first century,
and one in five throughout the Empire. We should know two important things about slaves in
the ancient world. First, in the eyes of the law a slave was not a person, but a A
slave was totally dependent upon his A master could do absolutely anything that
he liked to the slave. A slave had no at all. A master could beat him, sell him,
throw him out, or even kill him. Second, slaves had no that they could call their
own; every moment belonged to the master.
But, there is a of slave that is different! This slavery demands, but it also
beyond measure. Paul describes himself, "Paul, a bond-servant of Christ Jesus,
called as an apostle, set apart for the gospel of God" (Romans 1:1). When you're a bond-
servant or slave of Jesus Christ, you in the Lord. It's only when you become

Our reading today comes from the book of Philippians 2:5-11.
Our world seems to think that the point in life is to be the boss, and to control
what goes on around us. The rugged individualism of America calls out for self-fulfillment and
your own course. Many never realize that there may be Someone bigger than
themselves; Someone that calls them to a life grander and nobler than living for your own
One in five Americans think that meaning and purpose comes from working
hard to as much as you possibly can and to make the most of life. Nevertheless, is
this there is to life?
The Lord Jesus provides a different perspective for us all; one that helps us to see what
really in life. In Mark 10:42-45 Jesus said to His disciples, "You know that those
who are considered rulers of the Gentiles it over them, and their great ones exercise

authority over them. But it shall not be so among you. But whoever would be great among you
must be your, and whoever would be first among you must be slave of all. For even
the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."
In the Lord's eyes, the greatest one must be the slave of all. He serves to please the Father and
to please others. He sees something bigger than his own pleasures. We see the servant heart of
Jesus when we see that He sacrificed Himself upon the Because He knows what it is
to serve, the Father highly Him and gave Him a name that is above every name.
The apostle Paul grew up in a privileged Hebrew home and he was even schooled under the
famous teacher Gamaliel, who was the highest teacher in Jerusalem. Yet Paul
said, "For though I am free from all, I have made myself a servant to all, that I might
more of them" (1 Corinthians 9:19). Winning souls was more to Paul than
freedom to do as he wished. He was to sacrifice himself and serve others that he
might win them to the Lord Jesus.
Paul willingly gave up his among the Jews in order to for Christ.
Read what Paul said in Philippians 3:4-11. Some things are bigger, nobler, and worth more
than what any of us put on our resumes. This is why Paul would give it all up, and why you
should consider serving the Lord.
The Scriptures speak of slavery from the earliest times. The Old Testament Law actually
Hebrew slaves from being abused. In fact, some people even chose to
as permanent slaves. Read what the Hebrew Law said in Exodus 21:2-6. This

recognizes that He indeed existed in the form of God; but it also recognizes His authority over
my life. He's not just Lord; He is my Lord. "Or do you not know that your body is a
of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own,
for you were with a price. So glorify God in your body" (1 Corinthians 6:19-20).
As Christians, we belong to the Lord Jesus body, soul, and spirit.
The Lord Jesus is our Master! He said, "No one can serve (be a slave to) masters;
for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will hold to one and despise the other.
You cannot serve (that is, be enslaved to) God and mammon (or money)." (Matthew 6:24). As
Master of our lives, Jesus will not tolerate master. If we belong to Him, Jesus must
always be the undisputed master of our lives. We don't ask, "What do want?"; but rather
we ask, "What does wish me to do?" We serve at His pleasure in His

A partial service to God or a faith that's "off and on" is not The Lord said,
"But seek the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be
added to you" (Matthew 6:33). We must live each day with God at the of our
hearts. Seeking His kingdom and seeking His righteousness means focusing our hearts on
Him as His people, doing His will.
The Lord Jesus Himself serves as the great of a servant who seeks to please.
The apostle Peter knew the of servants in the first century. He taught them,
"Servants, (you) be submissive to your masters with all, not only to those who are
good and gentle, but also to those who are unreasonable. For this finds favor, if for the sake of
conscience toward God a person bears up under sorrows when suffering unjustly" (1 Peter
2:18-19). Then Peter points to Jesus, "For you have been called for this, since
Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example for you to in His steps, who
committed no sin, nor was any deceit found in his mouth; and while being reviled, He did not
revile in return; while suffering, He uttered no threats, but kept entrusting Himself to Him who
judges righteously; and He Himself our sins in His body on the cross, so that we
might die to sin and live to righteousness; for by His wounds you were healed" (verses 21-24).
Jesus set the example of how to bear up under He didn't strike back or berate
the Jews who were berating Him. Instead He entrusted Himself to the Father who judges
righteously; He left things in the Father's He didn't focus on the of the
cross, but on the importance of doing what was right and the importance of what He was doing
in saving mankind: the Bible says "by His wounds you were healed." He suffered so that you
could to sin and live to righteousness. Jesus chose to please the Father in bringing about
the salvation of every one of us, if we follow Him, even if it meant going to the cross. Jesus
knew His death would mean something to the Father. He said, "He who sent Me is with Me.
He has not left Me, for I always do the things that are pleasing to Him" (John 8:29).
Read the instructions that Paul gave to those who were slaves or bondservants in
Colossians 3:22-25. People should do a day's work for a day's pay and be to those
that they serve. When you work heartily at the job, you're "serving the Lord Christ." By being
faithful to the Lord in this life, even on the job, you can trust the Lord to you in the
life to come. Whether a master or a slave, the Lord will reward righteousness and He'll
evildoing.
As Christians, we must have a servant's heart. Paul urged the Christians, "And so, from the
day we heard, we have not ceased to for you, asking that you may be filled with the
knowledge of his will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, so as to walk in a manner
of the Lord, fully pleasing to him: bearing fruit in every good work and increasing
in the knowledge of God" (Colossians 1:9-10). If you seek to please the Lord, you must know
Him and you must know what He wills. Many people God but they know little
about Him. It does little good to own a Bible but never open it and read it and study it. Study

your Bible and then apply the words and the teaching there to your life.

asked, "Do you not know that if you present yourselves to anyone as obedient slaves, that you
are slaves of the one whom you obey, either of sin, which leads to death, or of obedience,
which leads to righteousness?" (Romans 6:16). Choosing to serve sin is a

whom or what you choose to serve.
Paul said, "But thanks be to God, that you who were once slaves of sin have become
obedient from the heart to the standard of teaching to which you were committed, and, having
been set from sin, you've become slaves of righteousness" (Romans 6:17-18). They
left their old ways of sin and obeyed the Lord from the heart, and God set them free from sin.
God can also set you free from sin, if you too will obey from the heart the standard of teaching.
Trust in the Lord with all your heart; believe in Him and in His Repent of your
sins; confess Jesus as the Christ, the Son of the living God; and be into Christ for
the forgiveness of your sins. When you're baptized into Christ and His death, God

to us today; and for this reason, we take time to examine them closely. We want to know
everything that we can about the God who created us, sustains us, loves us, and desires to
us eternally. Our life, our identity, and our future are wholly upon
God. Every breath that we take, every drop of water you drink, and every bite of food that we
eat comes from what He Every of life comes from God. Of course,
we want to know all that we can about Him.
One can only imagine how life would be without Jesus. Jesus is the Son of
God, the Lord, the Messiah, the Christ, the light of the world, the King of kings and Lord of
lords, the Alpha and Omega, the Holy One, the Son of Man, the Word, the Savior, the
Advocate, the Suffering Servant, the Lamb of God, the Great High Priest, the I AM, the
Shepherd and Guardian of your Souls, the Lion of the Tribe of Judah, the pioneer and the
perfector of our faith, the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation. No person
who ever lived is like Jesus; no blood but His blood can us from sin; no words
but His Words will us on the last day; no power but His power can us up
on the last day; and no way but His way can us to the Father in heaven. You may

truth." Someone once asked a preacher John called Jesus Christ "the Word." It
seemed a description to him. The preacher answered, "Words are the means that
permit us to communicate with others; John used it to show that Jesus Christ is the only

Second, because of Jesus, I know what truly is all about. First John 4:7-10 says,
"Beloved, let us love one another, for love is from God, and whoever loves has been

love. In this the love of God was made manifest among us, that God his only Son
into the world, so that we might live through Him. In this is love, not that we have loved God
but that He loved us and sent His Son to be the propitiation for our sins." The Father's
willingness to His Son, Jesus, and the Lord Jesus' willingness to the
cross for our sins reveals the love of God in clear and touching ways. No one has ever loved
you like Jesus loves you or died for your sins as Jesus did. No one else could!
The love of Jesus is far than just being our atoning sacrifice. Jesus
understands us and allows us to approach Him with confidence, even in times of
Hebrews 4:15-16 says, "For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with
our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been as we are, yet without
sin. Let us then with confidence draw near to the of grace, that we may receive
mercy and find grace to help in time of need." Not only can we approach the Lord Jesus, our
high priest, we can find grace to you and me in dealing with our temptations. Jesus is
doing everything He can to us. He wants us in with Him.
Jesus predicted that Peter would Him three times before the rooster crowed, and
Peter did indeed deny the Lord. But, I want you to see what the Lord said to Peter, even
that Peter would deny him. Luke 22:31-32 says, "Simon, Simon, (that's, Peter)
behold, Satan demanded to have you, that he might sift you like wheat, but I (Jesus) have
for you that your faith may not fail. And when you have turned again, strengthen
your brothers." Have you considered that even when you, the Lord Jesus is praying
for you? He loves you.

and transferred us to the of His beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the
forgiveness of sins." Jesus' blood, not silver or gold and not some kind of precious metal, is
what redeemed us from sin. Because Jesus suffered, and shed His blood, we don't have to
the consequences of our sin.
